**HIGH Fitness**

**Youth flag football**

This program is for boys and girls in grades 2-9. In addition to the registration fee, there is a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible jersey for grades 2-9. All games are played at the Highland Field just north of the Lone Peak Seminary Building.

**Tot Soccer**

Tot Soccer is a fun, six-week soccer league for children ages 3 & 4, offered in both the spring and fall each year. Registration fee is \$30 plus a one-time fee of \$5 for a reversible jersey. Games are played at Mesquite Park in Cedar Hills. Parents are encouraged to coach, if possible.

**K-12 Soccer**

Soccer league is offered in the spring and fall for boys and girls in kindergarten through second grade. This league will now be paying 8 games instead of 6 games like years past. They play with a reversible jersey that costs \$5, but it can be used for flag football, as well.

**The Co-ed Teen Soccer League**

This program is for high school students, grades 9 through 12. Teens form their own teams and enter the team name when they register. There are eight players per team on the field with at least four girls per team. The cost per player is \$50, which includes a shirt. Games are played on Monday afternoons at Mesquite Park in Cedar Hills.

**Updated Fire Restrictions**

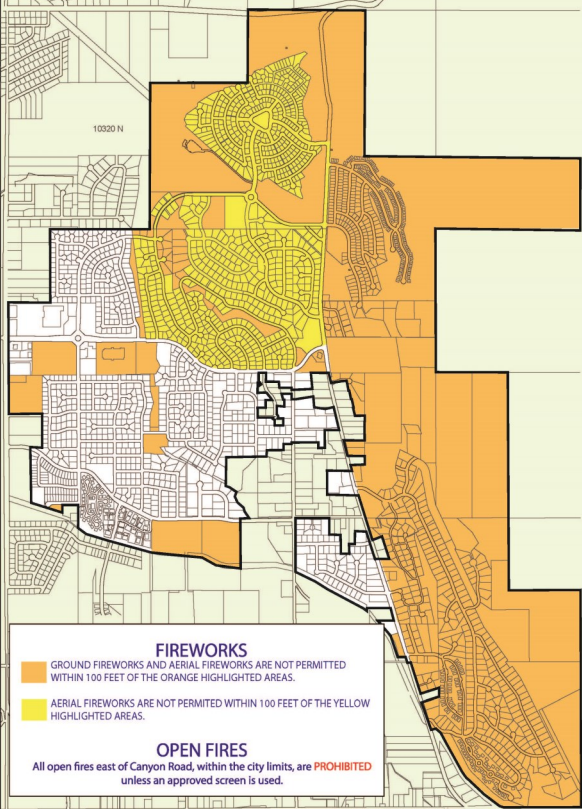

## TALK SHOP WITH A COP



While no one likes to receive a citation or be the subject of an arrest these types of actions serve a purpose in the criminal justice system. We have been covering domestic violence in the newsletters for the last couple of months. Cohabitant abuse is one of the few laws that require an officer to make an arrest or issue a citation when there is evidence a crime has occurred. The State has made this mandatory to allow the courts the opportunity to intervene and break the cycle of violence and to help improve the lives of those who find themselves living in an abusive or dysfunctional environment. The citation or arrest is the gateway to the criminal justice system, especially in domestic violence and drug offenses. Citations and arrests are not strictly to punish the individual. Domestic violence has been shown by research to be multi-generational for both victims and offenders.

At the police department, we hold weekly meetings with city prosecutors to discuss active cases before the court and work to develop the best solution to each individual case. This may include anger management counseling, substance abuse counseling, employment counseling, or other resources meant to address each unique situation. This is further enhanced by the efforts of our Victim Advocates who can work with each victim to help determine why the abuse is taking place. Victim Advocates can work with victims to help them through the court process, help them obtain protective orders, and answer other questions. Victim Advocates are here to be a resource for those who find themselves in the criminal justice system and for those who have questions or information before the court system becomes involved.

## STORM WATER TIP OF THE MONTH

### What can you do? Pool/Spa Maintenance



When emptying a pool or spa, here are a few things you'll want to keep in mind: **1:** Never discharge pool or spa water to a street or storm drain. **2:** When emptying a pool or spa, let chlorine dissipate for a few days, and then recycle/reuse it by draining it gradually onto a landscaped area. **3:** Do not use copper-based algaecides unless absolutely necessary. Control algae with chlorine or other alternatives. Copper is an especially strong herbicide and doesn't degrade to less toxic forms quickly.

## Parking for Boats and Trailers

A friendly reminder NOT to use public streets for long-term parking of cars, trucks, trailers (for work or play), RV's, boats, campers, basketball standards, etc. According to city ordinances, such items cannot remain on the street for more than 48 hours. Keep all of the above-mentioned items on hard surfaces on your property.

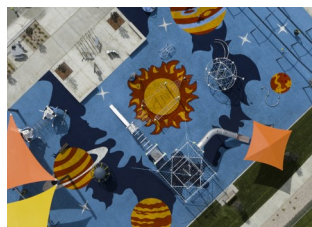
## County's Reverse 911 Emergency Alert

### Notification System Implemented

This system enables us to provide critical information quickly in a variety of situations, such as severe weather, law enforcement activity, missing persons, and evacuations of buildings or neighborhoods. When you sign up, you ensure that we have the most up-to-date information to reach you in the event of an emergency. You will receive time-sensitive messages wherever you specify, such as your home, mobile or business phones, email addresses, text messages, and more. The alert system is subscription based and you can sign up for different subscription alerts in multiple cities in Utah County.
